Superintendent's Breakfast



On October 11, 2017 Lincoln School and Lincoln Annex held a morning Title I breakfast and an evening meeting for parents with our Superintendent, Dr. Solter to discuss goals for the year, Title I services, and the new standard based report

cards for kindergarten and grades one and two.

Dr. Solter talked about student success and his three goals for the 2017-2018 school year:

Goal #1: Increased Family Engagement

- Studies show that increased family engagement is a strong indicator of student success. Not only will the district hold meetings for parents, but also involvement in participating in Saturday and evening parent workshops offered through Title I, as well as library activities.
- Our district website is another great way for parents to stay connected.

Goal #2: Increase rigor and relevance in curriculum and instruction

- We want students to think at a higher level, not just answering basic knowledge questions.
- The kinds of questioning will require evidencebased answers.
- Relevance is something that we need to do as educators so that children can connect to what they are learning.

Goal #3: Increase technology use and devices

- Within the next 2 years, we plan to increase the number of devices for all students
- We want students to not just use technology to find answers but to use it as a tool
- Devices should also be used to communicate more

Ms. Eugenia Ramos discussed Title I services that are available to students and various programs offered to Title I students:

- Saturday Morning Program
- iPad After School Program
- Reading Club
- Parent Workshops
- IXL online practice program

In the evening, parents of kindergarten and grades one and two students packed the Lincoln Annex auditorium. Dr. Solter presented a PowerPoint on the new standards based report cards for grades kindergarten,1 and 2. The new report card is meant to target specific standards that a child should meet each marking period. It will help to better identify student strengths and areas of improvement.

Health News

PARENT INFORMATION



The goal of our Health Services is to promote optimal health of students, provide a safe environment, maintain positive attitudes and teach safe health practices. As always, all medical

information is kept confidential. We want our students to be happy and healthy to learn in school. Medical Office tel# 201-295-2848

THE FOLLOWING GENERAL INFORMATION MAY ASSIST YOU AS PARENTS:

- ABSENCES: When your child is sick and needs to stay home call the Attendance Office.
- TARDINESS/LATE: Bring your child to the main office for a late pass.
- MEDICAL TIPS: Keep a sick child home for fever over 100.0, diarrhea, vomiting, flu, pinkeye (conjunctivitis), rashes of unknown origin, or if your child's doctor instructs you to. If your child has a cast, crutches or will need the elevator please see the nurse before he/she comes to school. A note from the doctor will be required.
- HOME INSTRUCTION: Any student who will be absent for longer than 2 weeks may require a home tutor. This will require a doctor's note requesting tutor. Please see the nurse as soon as possible if tutor needed.
- CLASS PARTIES: Some students in your child's class may have food allergies. Please do not send food for parties into school as per Board of Education policy.
- PEDICULOSIS (HEAD LICE) SCREENINGS: Screening is conducted randomly and when needed by the nurse throughout the school year. As per the recommendations from the American Academy of Pediatrics: Students will be sent home for treatment and can return to school following. The nurse will check the rest of the class. The nurse will recheck your child for a few weeks to check the progress. Your doctor can help if needed.

ANNUAL HEALTH SCREENING PROGRAMS (state of NJ):

- 1. Height/Weight all students
- 2. Vision Screening grades K, 2, 4, 6, 8, 10
- 3. Audiological (Hearing) grades K, 1, 2, 3 7, 11
- 4. Scoliosis (Back or spine) grades 5, 7, 11

MEDICATIONS AT SCHOOL: If your child will need medication during the school day/year please see the nurse. Written permission from the doctor and parent should be returned to the nurse and all medication must be in the pharmacy container properly labeled. No

morning or late day medications will be given unless there is an emergency need. Only medications required for life threatening emergencies will be given on a field trip. Your doctor may suggest that asthma inhalers and Epipens be carried by students in their backpacks for immediate use when needed, please speak with your nurse if that is the case.

SPORTS PHYSICALS: Any student playing a school sport in grades 6-12 must have a sports physical exam done by their doctor prior to the sport starting. The physical forms can be found on the North Bergen home page under athletics and Bruin forms. Return completed physicals to the nurse. www.northbergen.k12.nj.us

ANNUAL PHYSICAL EXAMS: Physicals are recommended yearly. Your nurse will send home a form at the end of each school year. If your doctor completes a physical form, please return it to your nurse. VACCINES: All students who are entering grade 6 or are 11 years old are required by the State of NJ to have a Tdap and Meningococcal vaccine. Please provide proof to your nurse.

FLU VACCINE: All students in PreK are required by the State of NJ to have a flu vaccine before December 31. Please provide proof.

WHEN WILL THE SCHOOL NURSE CALL/OR WRITE ME A NOTE IF MY CHILD VISITS HER OFFICE:

- 1. Illness with fever, active repeat vomiting, diarrhea.
- 2. Head wounds or severe hit to head.
- 3. Severe wounds especially when may require sutures
- 4. Suspected broken bones/fractures "student states they can't walk".
- 5. Fainting, disorientation.
- 6. Suspected contagious illness.
- 7. Anything other student complaint or issue that the nurse feels she needs to report to you as needed.
